MICHAEL PLAYED BY CHRIS POTTER (QUEER AS FOLK)



In a disastrous blind date, Will is paired with the painful Neil. Having planned a careful escape alibi with Grace - that she has been rushed to the hospital - Will is taken aback when Karen's husband Stan is indeed rushed to hospital. The pesky Neil cannot take a hint and follows like a bad smell.

ALAN PLAYED BY HAL LINDEN (BARNEY MILLER)

Will lands himself a doctor - a plastic surgeon. An older man, the wealthy doctor pounced on Will during an art exhibition and before we knew it Will had a sugar daddy. Coping with lavish gifts is too hard for Will, not to mention his discomfort with his new toy-boy status. Beyond that is Will's realisation that he is past his twink years.



VINCE PLAYED BY BOBBY CANNAVALE (THE STATION AGENT)


A rough and ready Italian New York cop does it get any better than this? Perhaps the longest lasting of Will's relationships, Vince, the tough law enforcer had a softer side. Although he seemed the perfect catch, the two eventually clashed and the relationship ended, but is this one really over?

SCOTT PLAYED BY BRANDEN WILLIAMS (NEVER BEEN KISSED)

While Grace covers up her relationship with the embarrassing Nathan (Woody Harrelson), Will likewise tries to hide his current boyfriend, the very young video store clerk Scott. The cute boy seems incredibly young to Will and when Karen gets wind of the situation, she can hardly control her amusement, referring to Scott as the Mouseketeer.

TOM PLAYED BY DYLAN MCDERMOTT (THE PRACTICE)

While looking after his sick mother Marilyn (Blythe Danner), Will discovers that daily strolls in Central Park can be boring, until he meets the handsome Tom. The hunky man is also looking after his own mother and the two men fall for each other. It seems like kismet, until Will discovers Tom's Norman Bates-ish obsession with "mother".



GAVIN PLAYED BY MICHAEL DOUGLAS (WALL STREET)

When Will's laptop is stolen, detective Gavin Hatch takes charge of the case – and of Will. The detective goes to great lengths to be near Willy boy, even by organising a fake stakeout at a gay bar. But it all comes unstuck when Jack recognises Gavin as a neurotic from his therapy group.

PAUL PLAYED BY PETER JACOBSON (GOOD NIGHT, AND GOOD LUCK)

Shame Will Truman, shame! The nerdish Paul is smitten with Will, but Will is more interested in Paul's dog, Pepper. When Jack loses the pooch in Central Park, Will is emotionally blackmailed into continuing the relationship with the distraught Paul, until he discovers that Paul is just as deceitful. Pepper was just a decoy! MATTHEW

PLAYED BY PATRICK DEMPSEY (GREY'S ANATOMY)

While originally hit on by Jack in Banana Republic, a sexy sports reporter named Matthew, ends up having a fling with Will. Will tries desperately to match the sportsman's knowledge of all things sporty, but gets caught out as a fraud. Matthew doesn't care if Will can't score a goal, but the tables are turned when Will discovers Matt is still in the closet and feigns him off as a brother.


EDWARD PLAYED BY STUART TOWNSEND (QUEEN OF THE DAMNED)



LIFE AFTER W&G

While the final curtain is due to come down on Will And Grace in the US on May 18, there's talk of a Sean Hayes spin off and a Will And Grace movie. According to American media sources, the show's producers are trying to persuade Hayes to continue playing Jack MacFarland, but the star has reportedly gone cold on the idea due to the poor example set by Matt LeBlanc's spin off, Joey.

But the biggest surprise for Will And Grace may be in the show's final episodes. The producers are said to be negotiating with Heath Ledger and Jake Gyllenhaal to appear as guest stars, playing a gay couple and sharing an on-screen kiss.

Karen sets Will up on a disastrous blind date with her geeky cousin Barry. In a Pygmalion-style storyline, both Will and Jack decide to transform the newly outed Barry into something cool. When the results are better than expected, both Will and Jack fight over the transformed cutie. Barry chooses Jack and then Will, eventually dumping him in favour of exploring his newly found freedom.
